





THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

The Leader says

Gracious and Eternal God, with churches throughout the Diocese of New York this day, we approach the throne of thy heavenly grace with humility and awe, beseeching forgiveness for the sin of slavery and its lasting effects. We bring before thy sovereign majesty our prayers, our tears, our repentance, trusting in thy love and mercy for all thy children.

People and let our cry come unto thee.

We pray for thy Church, that Beloved Community into which thou art even now transforming us by thy grace. Grant that we may love all thy people as thou dost love us. Grant that we may serve thee, each other, and the world thou hast made as instruments of thy love, peace, justice, truth, integrity and transformation.

Lord, hear our prayer,

People and let our cry come unto thee.

We pray for all the parishes of the Diocese of New York; inspire us, O God, to discern the paths of justice, righteousness, and truth, and give us grace to walk with thee in this way.

Hear us as we pray for this parish, its mission, and its needs.

Lord, hear our prayer,

People and let our cry come unto thee.

We pray for all those who are in pain and trouble, for all that suffer from injustice and oppression of any kind. Especially at this time, we remember the pain and suffering of enslaved people and their descendants, the pain and suffering of abolitionists and their descendants, and the cruel indifference of the enslavers. We pray that we, their descendants, may persist in the pursuit of compassion, justice, truth, and love in thy Holy Name.

Lord, hear our prayer,

People and let our cry come unto thee.

We pray for our nation and for all that are in authority. Turn our hearts from greed and selfishness. Help us to use both our power and our prosperity to thy glory, and give us grace to uphold those founding principles that affirm that all are created equal, endowed by thee, their Creator, with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Lord, hear our prayer,

People and let our cry come unto thee.

Gracious and Eternal God, we bring before thy righteous and awe-ful majesty those who have been stripped of dignity, and dehumanized in this world through poverty, homelessness, hunger, deprivation, and every insensitivity. Help us in all our actions, led by the movement and power of the Holy Spirit, to see in all human beings, and most especially the marginalized, thine own image, and give us grace and power to repair throughout the world what our neglect hath broken.

Lord, hear our prayer,

People and let our cry come unto thee.

Mercifully lead us, we pray, to do justice, and to embrace kindness and compassion in our communities. Give us grace to make no peace with oppression. Deliver us, we beseech thee, from the fear and willful ignorance that prevent us from doing what is right. Help us to act decisively, to listen intently, to speak out responsibly, and to become involved in the concerns and needs of others, all for thy love's sake.

We pray for those who have died, especially for the souls of those who have suffered injustice, oppression, fear, horror or loneliness. May they be changed from glory to glory in the peace of God which passeth all understanding.



The People remain kneeling until the bell rings.

AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION (for those unable to receive Holy Communion)

BELIEVE in thee, O my Jesus, present in the most holy Sacrament of the Altar; I love thee above all things, and I desire to receive thee into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive thee sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace thee, and I unite myself to thee as if thou wast already there. Never permit me to be separated from thee!

O Lord Jesus Christ, let the sweet and consuming force of thy love absorb my whole soul, that I may die for the love of thee, who wast pleased to die for the love of me. Amen.

HOLY COMMUNION

All baptized Christians are invited to receive Holy Communion.

The Sacrament is distributed at the Crossing. Intinction (dipping the host in the chalice) is not permitted. You are welcome to receive in one kind only. Gluten free hosts are available - please ask the priest.


