



Session 2: Jesus. Let's recap where we started last week...



Fr Angelico - detail from the Annunciation (easy to miss)





Michael Ramsey said that there was one word which summed up God the Father's relationship with his creation...

Love

Love is at the heart of the Creator's relationship with his creation. Talk about Why he came...for love of us...take away our sins...to help us see God...1 John - that we have heard...Bishop Mary: "We are called to fight evil, but we are also called to know how to fight it. Evil is not effectively resisted with hatred and with guns. Evil cannot be defeated with evil, negation with negation, terror with terror, missile with missile. The process of negation must be reversed. Only affirmation can overcome

negation. Evil can be battled only by good. Hatred can be laid to rest only by love."



Dr. Martin Luther King Jr: "Now let me hasten to say that Jesus was very serious when he gave this command; he wasn't playing... because he was serious. We have the Christian and moral responsibility to seek to discover the meaning of these words, and to discover how we can live out this command, and why we should live by this command." Listen to what MLK has to say about putting this love into action. Preaching at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, Montgomery, Alabama, November 17, 1957



Jesus is God's fullest expression of love. Last week - God's loved his creation (it was very good).


READ - John 1:1-14 The Word LOGOS ...made flesh...John's Gospel.....In the beginning...light..grace...truth...glory...TORAH...*The Word was made flesh.* In the first letter of John...

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; 1 John 4:7-9 he goes on...everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; CLICK if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.




Symbol of the Fish...seen in Ephesus and elsewhere...






Secret symbol - the capital letters of five words...

















"I've seen it at The Louvre twice, and its sheer size and the symbolism are majestic.

The artist has paid tribute to one of Jesus' most reputable miracles by referencing it in his own time - imagining that if such an event were to take place in his version of contemporary Venice, this is how it might have looked and these are the guests who may have attended. I like how it depicts the timelessness of having the right values.

This painting has been the cause of 250 years worth of diplomatic incidents - and no doubt will cause a stir for at least the next 250 years as Italy seeks the repatriation of its stolen masterpieces. I think Jesus would enjoy the controversy of it all."

We talked about how Jesus' death on the Cross reconciled all things top God - bringing order back to the world...God/Man/Things...



Icon of the Resurrection which is known as the Harrowing of Hell...with Jesus pulling Adam and Eve out of Hades...Death was not the end but a new beginning...The Resurrection restores hope in a broken world.



This image was painted by one of our Pilgrims from last year's course, Jean Michael, It is a powerful representation of Christ that reveals his humanity and, yet, the eyes are similar to those of an icon - he looks past us. We thought about how, if Jesus is the image of the invisible God, then he is also the image of the perfect human being...therefore we can show Jesus with different features/skin pigmentation/cultures



This is called 'Navaho Madonna' - cultures all over the world have presented Jesus in their traditional dress, with their facial features, with their skin pigmentation. This is important because if Jesus is to save ALL people from their sins, we need to relate to him personally. Mo. Prisca shared a beautiful image of a Korean Christ on the Cross. Evangelicals often say that we must accept Jesus as 'My Lord and Personal Savior.' In the beginning was the Word... which reminds of Genesis...In the Beginning, in the darkness, God SAID 'Let there be light'... but Genesis also says, 'God's Spirit hovered over the waters...' At the Annunciation, Gabriel said that God's Spirit would OVERSHADOW Mary...




Why we bow at the 'et incarnatus' in the Nicene Creed. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.



Jesus is sometimes described as the Word of God (the Greek words is Logos)



The Greek word logos (traditionally meaning word, thought, principle, or speech) has been used among both philosophers and theologians. In most of its usages, logos is marked by two main distinctions - the first dealing with human reason (the rationality in the human mind which seeks to attain universal understanding and harmony), the second with universal intelligence (the universal ruling force governing and revealing through the cosmos to humankind, i.e., the Divine).



Jesus is sometimes described as the Word of God (the Greek words is Logos) - John's Gospel...In the beginning was the Word, [echo of Genesis]and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...full of grace and truth. Jesus was True God and True Man -

fully human and also fully Divine.

He is the image of the invisible God, the first-born of all creation; *Colossians 1:15*




Why is he coming?

Read Philippians 2:5-11

It is the SCANDAL of the Cross..does not make sense...except when we realize that God yearns for

us to return to him [parable of the Prodigal Son]



In 'Cafe Theology' - simple diagram of how things had become - the gulf separating us from God... how could God bridge that gulf? Incarnation and through experiencing suffering and death...bringing new life and hope. HANDOUT - read Cardinal Hume



Michael Ramsey once put it, "Is there, within or beyond our suffering and frustrated universe, any purpose, way, meaning, sovereignty? We answer, yes, and the death and resurrection of Jesus betray this purpose, way, meaning, and sovereignty as living through dying, as losing self to find self, as the power of sacrificial love." and another word for this is **glory...**



we beheld his glory...his glory would be revealed through signs - example - teaching - ultimately through his death and resurrection... glorification

The greatest sign of glory: HANDOUT - John 'when I am lifted up...'
