A note about the composer of tonight's setting of the canticles:

William Denis Browne, who served as an organ scholar of Clare College, Cambridge, was described by his supervisor Edward Joseph Dent as 'by far the cleverest of the musicians' at the university at that time. After a short career as an organist and music teacher, he was commissioned as a Sub-Lieutenant in the United Kingdom's Royal Naval Division during the First World War. He was wounded at the Dardanelles in May 1915 and had only just rejoined his unit when he was fatally injured a month later at Gallipoli. This setting of the Magnificat and Nunc dimittis was written while a student at Clare in 1911.




